## EVENTS AND WEBINARS



**Parveen Kumar** covered Expectation Gaps, Key Considerations in Audit of Power Sector and Standards on Auditing in several ICAI webinars. **Pankaj Aneja** was invited to speak at the Gurgaon Study Circle of ICAI where he shared insights on UAE Corporate Tax.


### ANNUAL DINNERS




## ASA JOINS BAKER TILLY

The overhead hoist system, used to lift him into his chair or bed due to his inability to walk (a result of his multiple learning difficulties), was swinging vigorously above one of the beds. This struck me as peculiar, given that the bars of the hoist are typically heavy, making it uncommon for them to sway so vigorously on their own.

Intrigued and somewhat uneasy, I checked the window, assuming perhaps it was open, and the wind was causing the movement. However, all the windows were securely shut. Voicing my bewilderment, I remarked aloud on the oddity of the hoist's inexplicable swinging. Unexpectedly, the man on the bed responded bluntly, "They play with it."

This response caught me off guard. This old man, who could only express himself through a limited number of words, provided an answer that sent shivers down my spine. Wanting more clarity, I asked, "Who plays with it?" Without hesitation, he replied, "They", and broke into laughter.

The old man's cryptic words, coupled with the hoist's eerie movement, left me deeply unsettled. To this day, the memory of that inexplicable night haunts me, the brief yet chilling encounter etched in my mind, evoking an enduring sense of unease.

Surprisingly, she told us that the previous occupants led an isolated and unfriendly life while performing rituals such as witchcraft. This has increased our anxiety levels even further. My father arrived around 11 o'clock with one of his friends. His friend asked for a matchbox as he wanted to light a cigarette, which my mother handed to him.

While doing so, she burst into loud laughter which we found really confusing.

She continued to laugh and eventually explained that today's episode was a result of her clever solution to adjust the mosquito coil, which didn't fit in the coil stand. She hung the coil inside the matchbox and placed it near the sofa. When the coil burned, all the matchsticks in the box ignited simultaneously, creating the fireball that had scared us earlier.

This was so funny, we eventually joined her in the laughter and shared the entire story with our father. That night became a funny narrative that we now share with all our friends and family dismissing the notion of a ghostly encounter.

## Virat Kohli

- Most centuries in ODIs: 50. Kohli became the batter with the most ODI hundreds overtaking his idol Sachin Tendulkar, who was the previous record holder with 49 tons to his name.
- Most runs in a single edition of the Men's Cricket World Cup: 765 runs at an average of 95.62, overtaking Tendulkar's record of 673 runs (2003).



## Mohammed Shami

- Fastest-ever to take 50 wickets in World Cup: in just 17 innings. His outstanding performance included 24 wickets at an average of 10.7, the third-best in a single edition of the World Cup.
- Best ODI bowling figures by an Indian: In the semi-final against New Zealand, his seven-wicket haul at Wankhede led to their downfall from 220/2 to 327 all out. Shami's performance marked the best-ever figures by an Indian bowler in ODIs.

## Rohit Sharma

- Most centuries at the Cricket World Cup: 7. His match-winning 131 against Afghanistan was his seventh Cricket World Cup century. He became the leading century-maker in the World Cups, surpassing Tendulkar (6) in the process.
- First player to hit more than 50 sixes in the tournament, with a total of 54 maximums to his name.





## Asian Games

India achieved a historic milestone at the Asian Games 2023 in Hangzhou with 107 medals (28 gold, 38 silver, 41 bronze).

- First time in Asian Games history, India's medal tally crossed 100.
- Shooting dominated with 22 medals, including 7 gold.
- Athletics, led by Neeraj Chopra, secured 6 gold, 14 silver and 9 bronze.
- Archery compound team swept 5 gold medals.
- Cricket, kabaddi and men's hockey teams earned 2 gold medals each.
- Chirag Shetty and Satwiksairaj Rankireddy won India's 1st Asian Games badminton gold.
- Squash, tennis and equestrian contributed to India's gold medals.



## Asian Para Games

India made history at the 2023 Asian Para Games in Hangzhou.

- Achieved their best-ever medal count: 111, with 29 gold, 31 silver, 51 bronze.
- Secured 5th position overall.
- 16-year-old Sheetal Devi, the only female shooter using her feet, won multiple gold medals.

## Winged Wonders of Uttarakhand

My interest to visit Sattal, Chopta and Mandal was fuelled during my visit to Bharatpur in 2019, by a fellow birder, who told me what those places were known for! A habitual haunt of the winged wonders! Since then, my desire to visit Uttarakhand has grown manifold.

I learnt that the myriad species of birds that visit these places, can be properly photographed, only with a thrice-a-year trip. November-December would be the first, February-March, the second, and May-June, the third. Known for their biodiverse and ecological amplitude, these places are frequented by over 250+ species of native and migratory birds.

The right opportunity for my visit knocked on my door in the month of November, 2022, when I came to know about Mr. Rohit Nayal, a tour operator and an efficient birder himself. But I could embark on the journey only in 2023, due to work commitments. Three of my friends who shared my zeal for a birding photography opportunity there, joined me.

On the first day of our trip, we checked into a hotel in Rishikesh. The evening Aarthi at the banks of river Ganga was a humbling and exhilarating experience all at once!

Worship by us Indians is basically our gratitude for all that we receive from Nature. We find divinity in them. Water is our elixir. Hence, we worship all water bodies that feed us. River Ganga is one of such major rivers that enrich our lives. Fire, we believe, is a purifier, which is why our prayers include fire as the Element that purifies our souls and that which carries our obeisance to the deity worshipped. Aarthi is one such religious ritual.

The Ganga Aarthi is held at Haridwar, Rishikesh and Varanasi. We were at



Rishikesh. The sky above the banks of the river Ganga remains lit bright by the Aarthi lights, long after the sunset! The vibrant colours that reflect the fervent devotion of the people gathered, the lights that brighten up every face intently focussed on the event, are all a visual treat. Especially so, to a photographer!

The landscape of Uttarakhand is marked by its snow-capped majestic mountains, lush forests, verdant valleys and meandering rivers like Alaknanda, Bhageerathi, and the mighty Ganga, along with its tributaries.

We enjoyed a wide range of colours come to life in the form of tiny to mid-sized birds, like the laughing thrush, crested kingfisher, blue whistling thrush, cheer pheasant, red vented bulbul, to name a few.

The Monal enjoys the status of being the state bird of Uttarakhand, and the national bird of Nepal. The next day would start early for us, to reach Thungnath before sunrise, to see the Monal, because, our guide Rohit had informed us that the peak of Thungnath before sunrise will present a magical lighting for us to capture the bird better.

The Thungnath trek was a moderately difficult one, due to its altitude and steepness, and with our photographic gears! The thrill of sighting Monal saw us brave the exhaustive trek.

As expected, the bird was a visual treat. The majestic white of the Himalayas in the background was a captivating backdrop to this colourful bird! The

male Monal is a multi-coloured bird. It has a predominantly azure body with a splash of green and traces of deep yellow, a brown tail and black belly. It was mesmerizing!

The lower Himalayan ranges is where Sattal is located and is home to 7 interconnected freshwater lakes, Purna Tal, Ram Tal, Sita Tal, Laxman Tal, Nal Damayanti Tal, Sukh Tal, and Garud Tal. Hence the name Sāth Tāl - Seven Lakes. Nestled among the dense forests with these beautiful lakes, Sattal is paradise to a diverse species of migratory birds. We explored birding in Sattal through all 3 categories it offers. The Studio, the Trails and the Hides. We were fortunate to sight and click the beautiful native and winter migratory birds of the Himalayan region. Most of the 100+ birds we clicked were lifers for all of us!

Uttarakhand would retain its position in my bucket list of places to visit! I will grab at the next opportunity to visit this place. Every time!


## A Journey to Boys' Dream Land

In conversation with  
**Prateet Mittal**

## How has the journey been with ASA from Assistant manager to Partner?

It has been almost 20 years and initially I did not think I would spend so much time here to be very frank. You have so many plans in your life at the initial stage, you never envision you would invest your most precious 20 years at the same place. Yet, looking back, these years have formed a family-like bond; it has been an incredible journey. We have weathered ups and downs, faced numerous challenges, but this is where we have landed today.

## How did you start at ASA?

After completing my CA, I met someone during our GMCS course, back then a trainee at ASA, through whom I learnt about the firm. Upon applying, I had a memorable first interview with Parveen. Surprisingly, he didn't ask any question. May be because there was nobody else in the team ☺ The only question he asked was if I could start the next day and that's how I joined ASA.

## How would you describe the firm's growth and evolution since you joined?

The firm's growth since my arrival has been truly phenomenal. Back then, the Delhi office housed only 25 to 30 individuals, with just one person handling the Assurance division. Maintaining a work-life balance is all about discipline and sticking to a routine. I find that arriving and leaving the office on time is crucial and after work, you have time for yourself.

## What inspired you to pursue a career in Auditing? Which qualities are required?

Auditing found its way to me rather than it being a deliberate choice, but since then, I have grown to love it and never thought of changing my field. The qualities essential for auditing encompass integrity, honesty and above all, the courage to deliver an honest audit opinion.

## If not a CA, what would you have been?

I had cleared the Air Force written exams but upon clearing my CA exams, I chose not to pursue Air Force further. The

disciplined and demanding lifestyle of the defence forces made me reconsider... I believed I would enjoy my life much more being a CA!☺

## Since this quarter's theme is "Brave Steps Forward", what is a step you believe has contributed to your success?

Most important thing is to keep enhancing your knowledge and your skills. Recognizing the need during PCAOB audits, I pursued my US CPA, an essential step that expanded my expertise.

## Is there a mistake from the past you would like to revert?

No, I don't believe in dwelling on past mistakes. Live in present, do your best and don't regret it.

## What advice would you give to someone starting their career in Audit?

Embrace hard work, it's the foundation of growth and gain as much knowledge as possible from your seniors and colleagues.

## What's the most creative excuse you've heard for missing documentation during an audit?

"Sir, although we meticulously completed all audit documentation and compiled a comprehensive audit file, regrettably, we're facing a challenge - we can't seem to locate the file. It appears to be missing."


