

If I could go back, I'd tell my younger self to relax, stop being so hard on herself, and let go of perfection. Childhood is too short to spend chasing medals and marks. It's about moments, mischief, and memories that truly matter.

A DAY WITHOUT SUPPORT SERVICE



Diamond in the rough

Whenever someone hears the name of the town Tiruchirappalli, the image of The Rockfort immediately comes to mind. Geologically, it is 3.8 billion years old, making it older than the Himalayas. The Rockfort is famous for the Ganesh Temple at its summit, but most visitors miss what lies beneath (literally).

The lower cave temple, built by the Pandyas on Chola land, is a hidden gem. You can reach this temple on the way to the Uchipillayar temple, which has been listed as a historical monument by the Archaeological Survey of India. The temple, being ancient, houses seven deities—Ganesha, Subrahmanya, Brahma, Surya, Sakthi, Vishnu, and Shiva—representing the Hindu Shanmatha doctrine of Adi Sankara. The main attraction of the monument is the statue of Lord Ganesha standing, which is a rare sight to witness elsewhere.

The lower cave temple has existed for over a millennium, yet it remains largely unexplored. Explorers must visit this place to witness its mesmerizing architecture.




Digital Lighting, Drone shows and Projection Mapping

Social Media and Online Campaigns
